My dear faithful of the archdiocese,

December 8, 2025, on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Heart of Mary and the Patroness of our Archdiocese, we will begin our celebration of the 200th anniversary of the Archdiocese. On January 27, 1826, Pope Leo XII erected the Diocese of Kingston and nominated Alexander MacDonnell as the first Bishop of Kingston. With this Papal act, Kingston became the second diocese in Canada and the first Roman Catholic diocese erected in the British Empire since the Reformation! It so happens that the anniversary begins as the Jubilee Year of Hope of 2025 comes to an end. It is our hope that the Jubilee will be a complement to the celebration of the anniversary with many combined graces for the Archdiocese.

The initial preparations for our anniversary began in 2024. The Priest’s Council of the Archdiocese met in that year to consider the general direction of our celebrations. I was deeply edified by their common desire to celebrate the anniversary in a manner that would aim to sustain the life of our many parish communities for future years. An anniversary committee was formed of lay people from across the Archdiocese and began the challenging task of planning our celebrations. An enormous amount of work has already been accomplished, and they deserve our deep thanks.

We live in the historical path of a wonderful heritage. Several weeks ago, on my return from the bishop’s meetings in Montreal, I stopped at the Church, St. Raphael, in the Archdiocese of Ottawa-Cornwall. This small community is the location where our first Bishop, Alexander MacDonnell, lived and offered his priestly and then episcopal ministry to the faithful of Ontario. Here, a Church was built along with a bishop’s house, and the small college of St. Iona for the education of young adults. After moving his residence to Kingston, the Lord blessed his tireless efforts with the development of many parishes, as the waves of settlement increased with every year of the nineteenth century. The establishment of the religious communities so dear to our present Archdiocese took place during this time. Their vocations and ministry led to the opening of many hospitals and schools, which have served the faithful over the years.

It is our hope to plan celebratory events with the aim of promoting parish renewal. We wish to avoid a year of celebration that will be quickly forgotten at the end of 2026. Rather, I pray that our celebrations may put in place the foundation for the continued renewal of the Archdiocese for the next 25 years. As always, this will take place within the heart of the Church, guided by the Holy Spirit, in the implementation of the Second Vatican Council, with attention to the particular needs of the Archdiocese in these years. A Eucharistic focus, a dedication to prayer and conversion, mark the Church’s renewal in each generation.

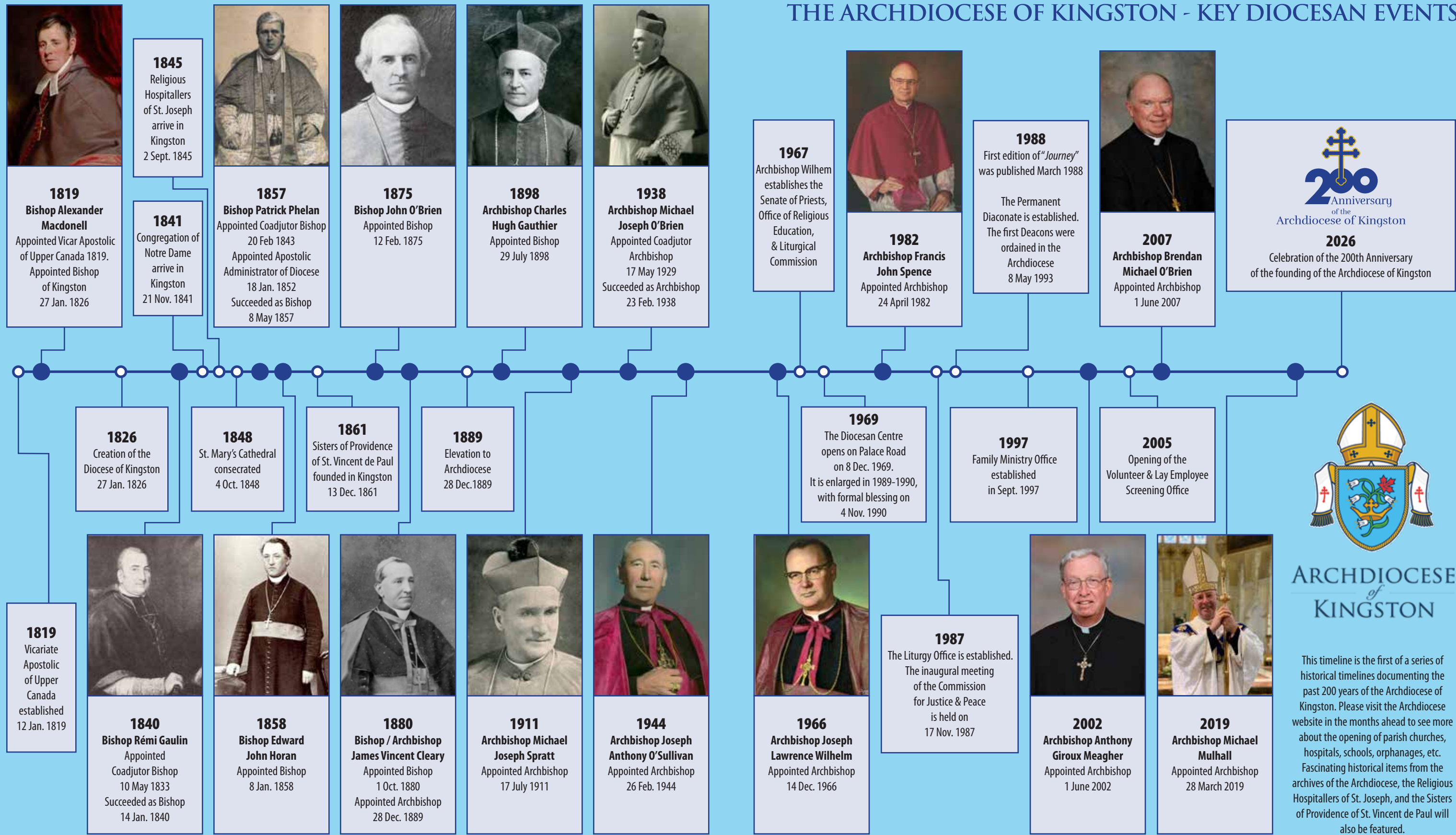
As a focused theme for the anniversary, I chose the following phrase from St. Paul’s letter to the Philippians, “To know Christ and the power of His resurrection” (Philippians 3.10). This phrase captures a beautiful sentiment and prayer in St. Paul’s heart as he writes to his beloved fellow believers in the city of Philippi. St. Paul is in prison. The Philippians have recently sent prayers and assistance to him. He, in turn, consoles and exhorts them in their spiritual pilgrimage, and he shares with them his deepest and most intimate desire to know Christ and the power of His resurrection. Through the ministry of the Church, these words are not only addressed to the Philippians mentioned above, but to the baptized in all ages. For centuries, these words, inspired by the Holy Spirit, have been a source of great strength to Catholics. Let us embrace these words for ourselves during this anniversary. May our souls express and strengthen a desire to know Christ, to listen to His words in the Gospels, to receive in faith His precious body and blood in the Eucharist, and in our prayer grow into a deep personal relationship with the Risen Christ. This will involve an experience of God’s overwhelming love, a movement of conversion from our sins, and a commitment to make Christ known to the world.

In subsequent letters, I hope to reflect further on these words of St. Paul and to appreciate more fully his understanding of the power of the resurrection. At this stage, let us begin with prayer. I invite you to read St. Paul’s letter to the Philippians and prayerfully reflect on the beauty of his writing.

Historically bishops weren't required to submit their resignation at a specific age, and a coadjutor bishop was often appointed when the diocesan bishop was elderly or incapacitated due to failing health.

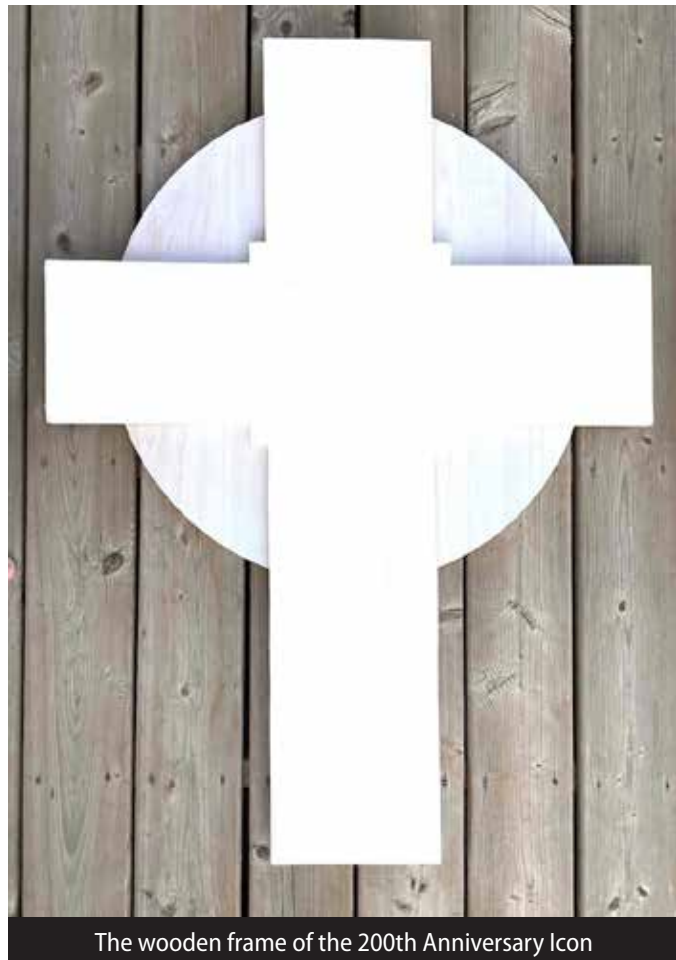


The 200th Anniversary Icon in process

THE CREATION OF THE 200TH ANNIVERSARY ICON

An Icon is a spiritual work of art created after many hours of prayer, fasting, and contemplation of scripture. The lengthy process is referred to as the writing of an icon. The images and design expressed in the icon depict a visual representation of the Word of God, and it takes months or even years to complete. Once completed, the icon receives a sacramental blessing of Holy Water, Oil of Chrism, and Incense, transforming the wood and paint into a holy object. This blessing confers on the icon, anointing for use as an object of veneration, aiding the faithful in contemplation and worship of God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

For centuries, Sacred Scripture was not accessible to many people due to the scarcity of printed books and the inability of many to read. The devotion of praying before an icon dates back to the early church and continues to inspire deep sentiments of union with Christ, the Word. Every detail on the surface of the icon has a purpose and meaning as set out in the canon of the Byzantine tradition that guides the writing of the icon.

Iconography is sacred art. Holy icons are a timeless phenomenon of the revelation of God, represented by colors, shapes, lines, and other elements of art. The most important principle of their creation is adherence to the established rules of writing icons. Thus, the iconographer strictly follows the Christian Tradition and the canons of iconography. This is why an icon is the Bible in colors

To commemorate the 200th anniversary of the Archdiocese of Kingston, an icon is being written on the theme, “To know Christ and the power of His resurrection” (Phil.3:10). It will be consecrated and installed in December 2025 at St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception Cathedral, Kingston. The faithful are invited to spend time before the icon, read and contemplate the images, and accept the invitation to come to know Him and the power of His resurrection in a deeply personal manner. A booklet will accompany the icon for those who wish to learn more about the symbols, colours, and composition used in the writing process.

INTRODUCING THE ARCHDIOCESE OF KINGSTON'S 200TH ANNIVERSARY PRAYER

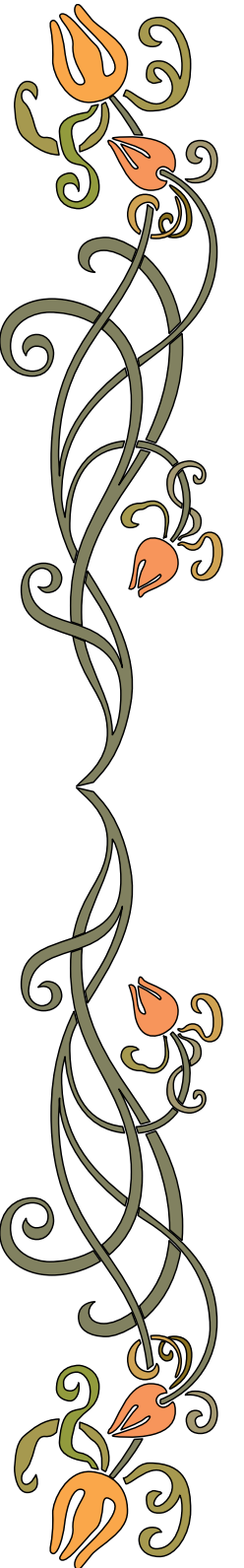
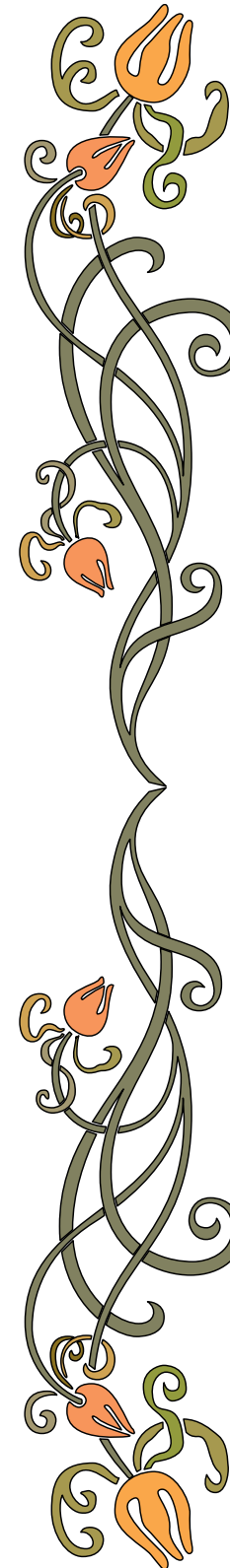

and through participating in your suffering and death,
come at last to attain
the glory of your resurrection.
You, who live and reign with the Father,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
God, forever and ever.
Amen.*

This simple but profound prayer beautifully captures the essence of this journey and reflects the deep longing of our hearts: to know Christ Jesus and to reign with Him through uniting the ups and downs of our ordinary lives to His suffering and death. By praying these words, we not only make thanksgiving for the faith passed down through the generations, but also recommit ourselves to the present and future mission, asking for the grace to do our part to continue building up the Archdiocese upon the solid rock of Christ by configuring our lives to the Cross so that future generations may continue to proclaim His holy name and share in His mission. Copies of this anniversary prayer can be found in all parishes, missions, schools, and institutions of the Archdiocese. Pray it often so that all may come to know Christ and the power of His resurrection.



Jubilee Year of Hope Exaltation of the Holy Cross Pilgrimage



Jubilee of Hope Pilgrims of the Archdiocese of Kingston at St. Mary Cemetery September 14, 2025

A beautiful fall day offered the perfect conditions for Sunday, September 14th, to celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. This holy day was chosen by the Central Deanery to organize a Jubilee Year of Hope pilgrimage open to all of the faithful of the archdiocese. In keeping with a tradition observed by many generations in the history of the archdiocese, a Eucharistic Procession was held at 3:30 p.m. at St. Mary's Cemetery, Kingston, led by Archbishop Mulhall. The Blessed Sacrament was carried by Archbishop Mulhall in procession through the cemetery to an altar for Adoration and Benediction, accompanied by priests, deacons, and consecrated religious. The altar was positioned in close proximity to the graves of the three founding religious orders: the Congregation of Notre Dame, the Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph, and the Sisters of Providence of St. Vincent de Paul. Following Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and Benediction, all present were invited to venerate the Holy Cross, which contained a relic of the True Wood of the Cross.

The Holy Cross was carried throughout the streets of Kingston from St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception Cathedral to St. Mary Cemetery by students involved in the Catholic Christian Outreach community at Queen's University. Many pilgrims from local parishes walked in this procession from the Cathedral with the Holy Cross.

Representatives from numerous parishes attended, including Catholic Women's League, Legion of Mary, and Knights of Columbus members, as well as visitors from other dioceses. Many families and children of all ages participated reverently and joyfully in the procession, waving flags and carrying banners.

Hymns of praise, led by a music ministry team comprised of members of different parishes in Kingston, resounded joyfully throughout the cemetery grounds. The Rosary was prayed in unison by those seated near the altar as the Eucharistic Procession progressed along the designated route. "This pilgrimage provided the opportunity for everyone to praise and worship God in the Blessed Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood and to receive the indulgences associated with Benediction, visiting a cemetery, and undertaking a pilgrimage in this Holy Year, the Jubilee of Hope", stated Fr. John Brennan. Fr. Brennan is Pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes parish in Kingston, Dean of the Central Deanery, and Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Kingston. Fr. Brennan, as well as Fr. Shawn Hughes, Fr. Jan Kusyk, Fr. Brian Russell, and their teams spent several months planning and organizing this Jubilee of Hope pilgrimage celebration.

This joyous celebration commemorating the Exaltation of the Holy Cross was a great sign of hope for the Archdiocese of Kingston. As the Jubilee Year of Hope comes to a close, Archbishop Mulhall reminds the faithful, "As pilgrims of hope, strengthened in our true identity, our task in 2026 will be to deepen our knowledge of Christ. I hope that the graces and fruits of 2025 will serve as a fitting introduction to our anniversary celebration in 2026. Let us pray that the Lord will bless our preparations, make holy our celebrations, and give His life-giving Spirit to our parishes now, and in future years as He has in the past."

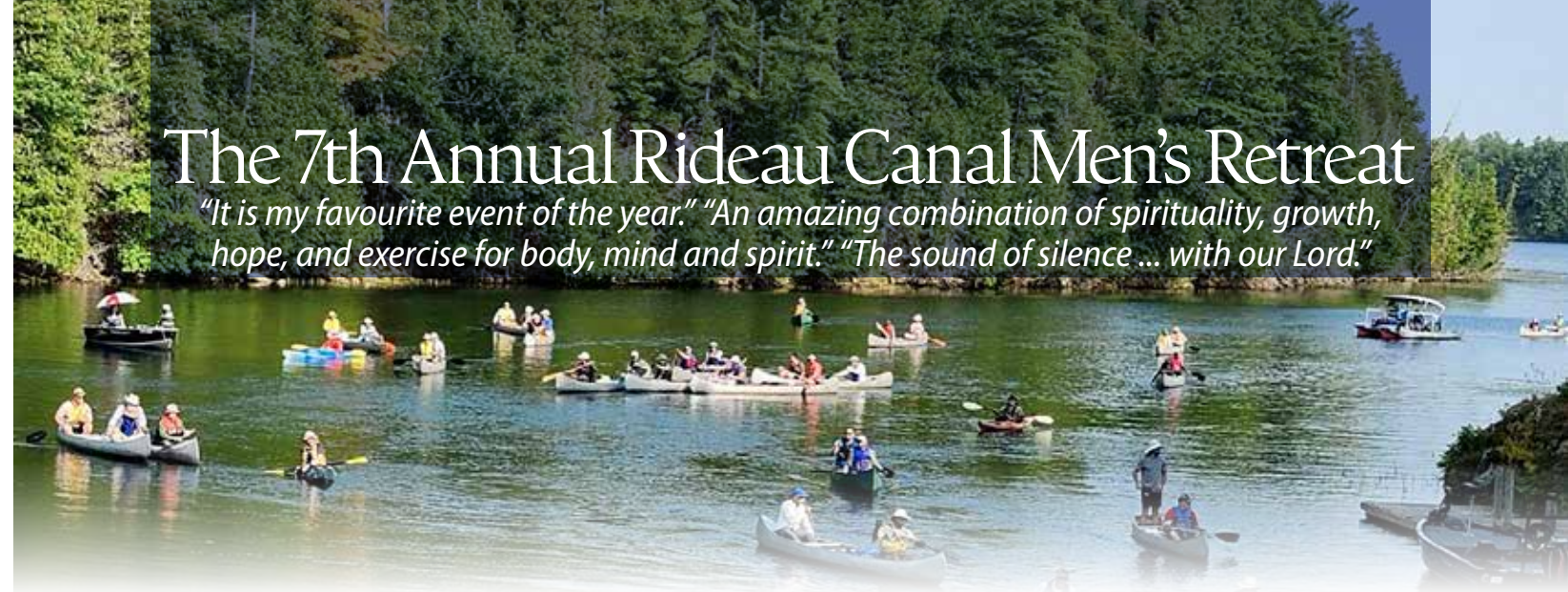

The 7th Annual Rideau Canal Men's Retreat

"It is my favourite event of the year." "An amazing combination of spirituality, growth, hope, and exercise for body, mind and spirit." "The sound of silence ... with our Lord."



The above comments are from those participating in the 7th Annual Rideau Canal Men's Retreat by canoe and kayak in August, 2025. A record number of fifty-six men, ages 13 to 82 and including six diocesan priests, enjoyed an inspiring pilgrimage over the waters of the Rideau Canal. This outdoor adventure was a God-given occasion to share and strengthen our faith as Catholic men, while enjoying camaraderie in a beautiful setting.

Over the course of three days we unpacked the Jubilee 2025 theme, "Pilgrims of Hope", in a practical way.

After making our way to Father Brian McNally's family farmhouse along the Upper Rideau Lake shortly after dawn on Tuesday, August 5, we travelled by bus to Seeley's Bay. Each man was assigned to his position in the stern or bow of the canoes, after which tents, sleeping bags and personal items were loaded into the watercrafts.

The pilgrimage officially began with the celebration of Holy Mass by Archbishop Mulhall in a nearby pavilion. After the Mass, instructions on water safety and how best to proceed through the Canal and its locks was followed by a stand-up breakfast. We then launched canoes, kayaks and accompanying motor craft to begin a 16 km journey northward over the waters of the lakes and channels of this UNESCO World Heritage Site.

The handiwork of the Creator and Divine Artist was on display throughout the pilgrimage, beginning with our passage over the clear, sparkling waters of Whitefish Lake and along scenic tree-lined shores, granite hills and canal cuts. Arriving at Jones Falls we were transported sixty feet upwards through four locks, and then docked briefly along the historic Stone Arch Dam. When completed in 1832, it was the largest dam (107 m X 18 m X 8 m) in both the British Empire and North America.



After a brief retreat talk we made our way across Sand Lake to Davis Lock. Tents were set up and dinner was enjoyed, followed by talks and a welcomed night's sleep next to the lock basin. Wednesday began with Holy Mass at 8 am, followed by Adoration and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. After breakfast we began a 17 km journey across Opinicon Lake, through Chaffey's Lock, and over the waters of Indian, Mosquito, Pollywog and Newboro Lakes. After passing through the lock into the scenic Newboro Canal, we reached Upper Rideau Lake, the summit of the system. We camped overnight on the McNally 1831 pioneer farm along McNally's Bay, enjoying retreat activities until departure Thursday afternoon.

Blessed by the Lord with perfect weather and protection from accidents and injuries, in addition to daily Mass we prayed the Holy Rosary together, received the sacrament of Reconciliation, swam, broke into the occasional lively song, and engaged in good-humoured banter. Quiet contemplation, conversation and interaction - plus a good deal of paddling and even a game of competitive frisbee - made this Catholic men's retreat a joyful, grace-filled and invigorating event again this year.



The enthusiasm of the participants should help ensure that the August 4-6, 2026 retreat is similarly well attended and enjoyed, providing a special occasion for Catholic men and their sons of the archdiocese and beyond to "know Christ and the power of His resurrection" (Philippians 3:10), the theme of this edition of *Journey*.

2025 Lenten Collection Update

Throughout scripture, we observe God’s particular concern for the downcast and marginalized, along with His desire for us to open our hearts to them. In the Old Testament, the most vulnerable in society are represented by the neediness and vulnerability of the stranger, the orphan, and the widow (see Psalms 146:9 and Deuteronomy 10:18). In the New Testament, Jesus broadens the scope of our concern to include all our neighbors with the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25a-37). Today, in our local communities, vulnerability manifests in issues like food insecurity, homelessness, mental illness, drug addiction, violence, exploitation, loneliness, and unstable families. This represents a poverty, both spiritual and material, that requires our compassionate attention and care.

Every Lent, our parishioners are called upon to help address poverty in all its forms by contributing to the Lenten Collection. This year, the collection was taken up on Ash Wednesday and remained open throughout the season, drawing

attention to the charitable aspect of Lent that colours its full forty days.* Parishioners, as they have done in the past, responded to the Lenten call for almsgiving with overwhelming generosity. To date, we have received a total of **\$89,825.73** from our parishes to be allocated to agencies serving our most vulnerable populations. This total was rounded to **\$88,000** to make distribution easier. The remaining funds and any additional donations will be rolled over to the 2026 collection.

As the liturgical seasons turn from the penitential season of Lent to the joyous celebration of the fifty days of Easter, and finally back to the regular cadence of Ordinary time, it can be easy to lose focus on the plight of our most vulnerable brothers and sisters. For our Young Adults Social Justice Committee, however, changing seasons means the reconvening of meetings and a renewed focus on pressing community issues. In May, a group of parishioners, 40 and under, from across the Archdiocese began to discern which agencies they would suggest for donations from the 2025 Lenten Collection. By August,

the committee submitted a list for Archbishop Mulhall’s consideration and the final selection was circulated to parishes shortly thereafter.

Though many community organizations are working tirelessly to address the systemic issues of our time, St. Paul’s Great Hymn to Charity (1 Corinthians 13:1-13) reminds us that without love, even our most well-placed intentions become hollow. Committee members thus intentionally sought agencies assisting vulnerable populations in practical and immediate ways, while also prioritizing hospitality, community, and connection. As in past years, agencies assisting with food insecurity, pregnant mothers, disadvantaged youth, and the unhoused were identified as recipients for donations in 2025. Human trafficking was also identified as a new priority during this collection cycle, as represented by the inclusion of **Beacon Bags** in Prescott.

Other new groups funded this year include **St. Francis de Sales’s Wednesday Lunch Program** in Smith Falls, the ecumenical **Friendship Lunch Program** in Kemptville, **St. Michael’s Senior’s Luncheon** in Belleville, **St. Gregory’s St. Vincent de Paul Committee** in Picton, **Society of Saint Vincent de Paul, St. Peter Conference** in Trenton, **Morningstar Mission** in Napanee, **QueenCare** in Brockville, The **San Damiano Foundation** with locations in Madoc, Trenton, and Tweed, and the **Help our Students Program**.



The Friendship Lunch Program is held weekly at St. John’s United Church in Kemptville, serving the community of North Grenville by providing a nourishing meal and fellowship.

Agencies that have received donations from the Lenten Collection in the past were also included in this year’s list, as they continue to do invaluable work addressing the pressing needs of our community. These agencies include **Grace Inn Shelter** in Belleville, **St. Mary of Egypt Refuge** in Queensborough, **Birthright** in Belleville and Kingston, **Society of St. Vincent de Paul Thrift Store** in Belleville, **St. Vincent De Paul Society** of Kingston, **Anchor of Hope** in Madoc, and **Pregnancy and Family Care of Quinte West** in Trenton. Two parish-based food programs, **Holy Cross Knights of Columbus Council 5333 Food Bank** in Kemptville and **St. Mary’s Drop-In Centre & Veronica’s Veil Overnight Shelter** in Kingston, also received donations. Finally, two groups with long-standing connections to

the Archdiocese were granted funds: **the Natural Family Planning Association – Ontario** and **the missions of the Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph** in Peru, Mexico, and the Dominican Republic.



Seniors Days at St. Mary of Egypt Refuge enable urban and rural seniors to enjoy a retreat to nature, companionship, working with youth volunteers as well as a beautiful lunch from our organic garden.

It is a privilege to work alongside Archbishop Mulhall and the Young Adults Social Justice Committee each year to help steward the generous giving of our faithful. Thank you to all our parishioners for their continued support of our vulnerable brothers and sisters.

***Note: Parishes and parishioners may anticipate this pattern of giving as the new normal for the Lenten Collection moving forward. The Lenten Collection will begin on Ash Wednesday, and parishioners will have the entirety of the Lenten season to contribute.**

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Father Daniel Casey, Father Denis Casey and Sister Margaret Tierney in the Hotel Dieu Hospital, Kingston, Bishop’s Suite [1920s]. From the beginning of the Hotel Dieu Hospital in Kingston in 1845, the Sisters and the clergy maintained a special relationship. Priests provided spiritual care for the sick and dying at the hospital and the Sisters cared for ill and infirm priests, including reserving a “Bishop’s Suite” in the Sydenham Wing for their care.

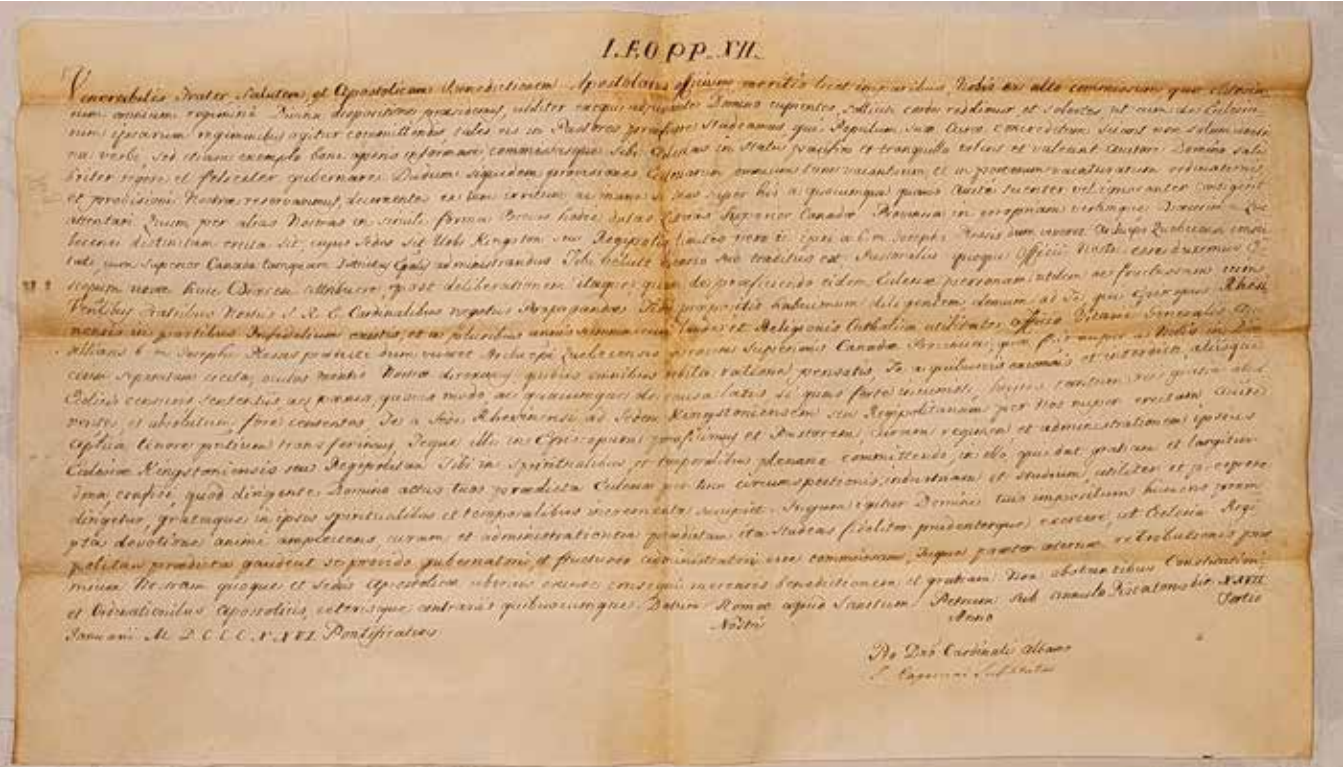


King's Visit
